Festivals & Events

Las Fallas (March) – Valencia's most famous festival, featuring massive artistic sculptures (fallas), fireworks, and incredible street parties.

Semana Santa Marinera (April) – A unique Easter celebration in the maritime districts (Grau, Canyameler y Cabanyal), featuring elaborate processions.

Festival de les Arts (June) – A must-attend music festival blending indie, electronic, and alternative acts with art and culture.

Feria de Julio (July) – A month-long celebration with concerts, cultural events, and fireworks.

Jazz Festival at Palau de la Música (July) – A great opportunity to experience live jazz from international and local artists.

La Tomatina (August) – A world-famous tomato-throwing festival held in Buñol, just outside Valencia.



Transportation

In Valencia, getting around is easy due to the city's manageable size. You can take the bus, metro, tram, ride a bike, or simply walk. Everything is safe and straightforward, and most places are within walking distance.

Traveling to other European cities is also convenient. Valencia has an airport, three train stations, and a bus station, or you can use the BlaBlaCar service. As a hub in Europe, Valencia makes it simple to explore new destinations.

The city is less than two hours from Madrid by AVE, Spain's high-speed train; three hours from Barcelona; five hours from Seville; and just a two-hour flight from Paris, Rome, and London.

Useful transport apps include EMT, Free Now, Cabify, and Moovit.

Valencia has an excellent public transportation system, including buses, trams, and metro.

Embrace the local culture

Take part in traditions like Las Fallas (March) and experience the city's passion for food, from paella to horchata.
